

BICF Marriage Policy

Marriage is the exclusive and sacred union of one man and one woman for life (Genesis 1:27, 2:23-25; Matthew 19:6; Malachi 2:14; Ephesians 5:22-33). It is a (symbolic) picture of Christ's everlasting, unbreakable, love for His Church. Marriage is an expression of unity, where husband and wife become, in a sense, two persons in one. This unity is not only a physical unity; it is also a spiritual and emotional unity of profound dimensions. BICF Pastors will perform marriages for a man and woman who have not been divorced, this is God's ideal. We may consider exceptional cases after careful examination by the Elders (Matthew 19:3-9, 5:32).

BICF Leadership Marriage Policy

Pastoral, elder, and deacon positions in the BICF may not be held by anyone who has been divorced and remarried or who is married to someone who has been divorced and remarried as long as previous spouses are still living (1 Timothy 3:1-13).

BICF Pre-Marital Counseling Guidelines

What We Believe

Marriage is one of the most important commitments a person can make. Second only to your decision to follow Christ, marriage will have a great impact on your life, your family, your friends, and your future. We all know the sad fact that many marriages are failing in our time. One reason is because far too many churches have failed to recognize their responsibility to properly equip people to enter into and maintain marriage. We want, with God's help, to help you as much as we can to be ready to marry. Performing wedding ceremonies is our choice; it is not something we are obligated to do. This means if we feel you and your fiancé are not ready, or should not be married for any reason, we will decline to perform your wedding and share with you why we believe this to be true. In Christian marriage, you are making a vow to God to fulfill all that He requires for marriage as outlined in the Bible. Because of the great significance and importance of the marriage vows, all parties should approach marriage prayerfully, patiently, and honestly. Because we love the Lord and you, we want His best and your best.

How do you know if you are ready to be married by a BICF Pastor?

1) You and your fiancé are both believers in Christ.

If one of you is a Christian and the other is not then a Pastor will share with you the great value in first establishing a relationship with Christ.

2) You and your fiancé agree to demonstrate sexual purity during your engagement period.

3) You and your fiancé affirm Marriage is the exclusive and sacred union of one man and one woman for life (Genesis 1:27, 2:23-25; Matthew 19:6; Malachi 2:14; Ephesians 5:22-33). It is a picture of Christ's everlasting, unbreakable, love for His Church. Marriage is an expression

Meeting with a BICF Leader

We look forward to meeting you and discussing your marriage plans. These are the areas we will focus on:

1. Each couple must complete the attached Pre-Marital Questionnaire before counseling will be scheduled.
2. After you have submitted your questionnaire, an appointment will be made to meet with a pastor, in order to determine how to best move forward.
3. Before a final wedding date is set, the couple must complete pre-marital counseling. Normally this is about five sessions. Sometimes this can be partially done with other pastors/counselors in your homeland.
4. We rejoice with you at this happy time of your lives. And we suggest this time of counseling and reflection because even if you are a Christian, you can expect your marriage to have some problems or difficulties. That is normal for everyone. You must seek God's blessing, walk in the Spirit, and obey Him before, during, and long after the wedding.
5. A Christian wedding is a sacred event. Therefore, we sincerely hope your entire ceremony will be conducted with reverence, and centered on Jesus Christ. We hope this important truth will guide you in all the details of the planning, such as sensitivity to others in extravagance, modest dress, foods and beverages served. We would be glad to think through these important issues with you.
6. It will be your responsibility to make the arrangements for the proper legal recognition of your marriage in your home country(s). Our services and ceremony are intended for spiritual blessing and benefit of your married life.
